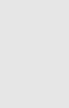
International Accreditation System for Interventional Oncology Services

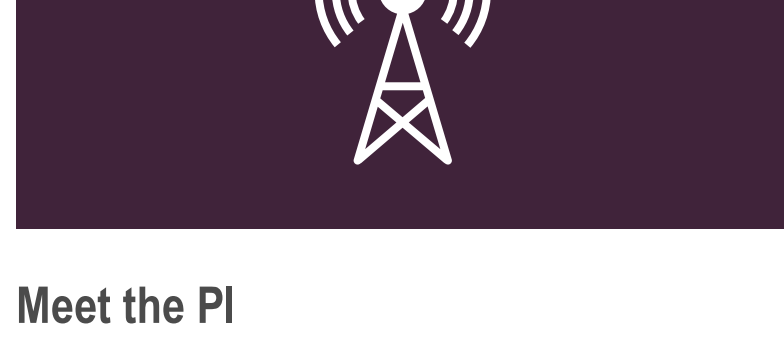
